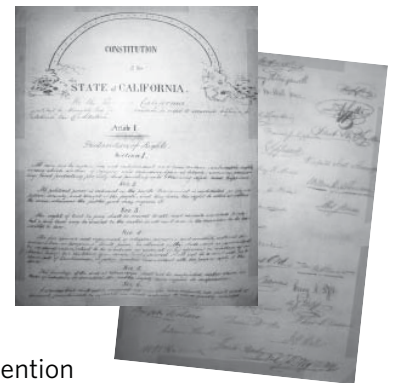
Visit the **Hall of Promise**. What is one promise or opportunity that you think is the most important to the growth of California? Explain why.
